I learnt this shloka in my dance class, where we chanted it.

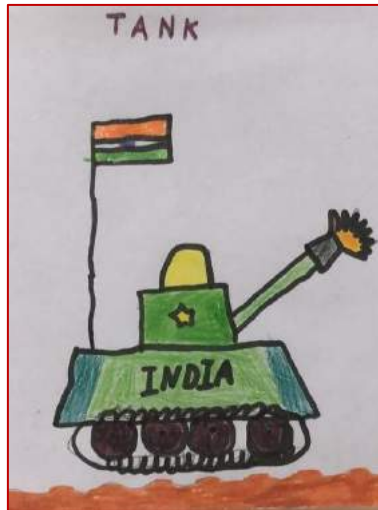

Community Helpers Day

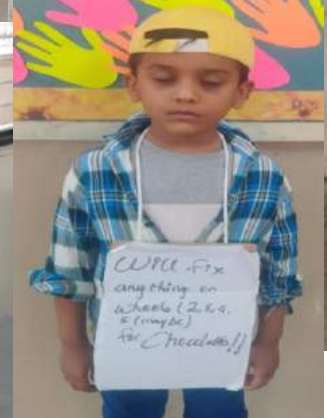

Miti Jain, Class Kg 1 B won silver medal in 2 lap ring, bronze in 1 lap ring Chhattisgarh roller skating state competition.



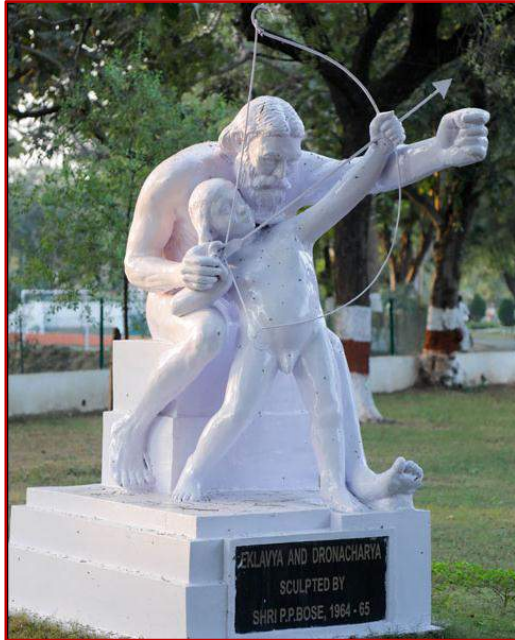
